- No locally controlled groceries, food markets, convenience stores or pharmacies will promote commercial infant or related toddler formula by preferential shelf placement or by ads.
- All non-locally controlled groceries, food markets, convenience stores and local
 pharmacies are encouraged to prevent local advertising of formula and to allow display
 space near infant foods and commodities for provision of breastfeeding literature and
 support information. T
- Share the U.S., The US Business Case for Breastfeeding is promulgated by the government and the Chamber of Commerce or equivalent.

- Workplace accommodation for breastfeeding workers is included in the Affordable Care
 Act (ACA) for hourly workers and is needed for breastfeeding to be successful following
 return to work.

Note from Love....I am beginning to formalize my thoughts around our race equity discussion from Monday during the Breastfeed Durham meeting.

All of the race advocacy organizations in the area, all the IBCLC's in private practice, and all of the doulas in private practice collaborate with at least two counties. Primarily Wake County, Durham County, and Orange County. But also depending on where they're located, they also cross into Johnston County, Chatham County, and Alamance County. Race equity work is exhausting. It's important to remember to share the load. Breastfeed Durham is about advocating

for Durham families. I was hearing from the Breastfeed Durham that someone without Durham in their name probably should take the lead on this. Individuals who are members of Breastfeed Durham would be part of the work, but Breastfeed Durham should be a member, but not the leader or the facilitator.

I brought this up with the Durham team because the disparities in our community are so great. Race equity has been at the center of our work in Durham from the beginning, but our race affinity groups are running out of steam. This is my suggestion for re-energizing the work.

I'd be willing to "shop" this idea around, letting other organizations and let them take the credit and the lead on the work as long as it's getting done.

In celebration of the themes of 2021's National Breastfeeding month, [Breastfeeding Family Friendly Communities or fiduciary organization] of [Chatham, Durham, and Orange County or North Carolina or communities involved] invites you to participate in our First Food Race Equity series A Shared Responsibility. Community members who are working to build effective alliances across divisions are welcome. We would be working together with the goal that racial equity impacts can truly benefit all communities. This series would occur every two months and last 90 minutes, beginning with a presenter, followed by a community listening session, ending with special attention in the last 30 minutes given to our breastfeeding families who are English language learners.

The series will provide a framework for understanding racial equity in the realm of the first food justice movement. Participants will learn how imbalanced and oppressive social structures prevent the inherent right for families of color to provide human milk as first food. Breast/chestfeeding is a primary food justice concern and our most important first food. Participants will identify inequities in breastfeeding rates and related health disparities that arise from structural failures to provide adequate support in communities of color. These concepts will encourage reformation in policies and procedures which will fuel collective impact and movement building for first food racial equity. In these sessions we will discuss why first food matters for communities of color across the triangle area. Research shows that the first 1,000 days of nutrition can set a course for a healthy life or perpetuate a cycle of poverty, ill health, and disease. The collective solutions solicited during these sessions will empower systemic change in the racial structures which impacts the first food field.

Notes for our meeting on breastfeeding-friendly health care.

Sent this to a Code of Marketing group... If you give a sample, are you then required to provide the supplement until the child doesn't need it any longer...(If the family does not have the resources to purchase ongoing and adequate supplies for the development of the infant, then a sample is not sufficient...and we also know that the brand that the clinic provides will influence the family's purchases.)

Regarding the compliance, the clinic must purchase the formula for retail price, that the formula cannot be given to the facility.

Duke provides a lot of free formula and they feel like it is a necessary service. They know the families they serve. They know the wishes of the parents they work with. My suggestion is that we try to support them in other ways.

Perhaps...

- 1. Have a written breastfeeding-friendly office policy
- 2. Train staff in breastfeeding support skills
- 3. Discuss breastfeeding during prenatal visits and at each well-child visit
- 4. Encourage exclusive breastfeeding for ~6 months
- 5. Provide appropriate anticipatory guidance that supports the continuation of breastfeeding as long as desired
- 6. Incorporate breastfeeding observation into routine care
- 7. Educate families on breast-milk expression and return to work
- 8. Provide noncommercial breastfeeding educational resources for parents
- 9. Encourage breastfeeding in the waiting room, but provide private space on request

10. Eliminate the distribution of free formula

- 11. Train staff to follow telephone triage protocols to address breastfeeding concerns
- 12. Collaborate with the local hospital or birthing center and obstetric community regarding breastfeeding-friendly care
- 13. Link with breastfeeding community resources
- 14. Monitor breastfeeding rates in your practice

From the Summary of Breastfeeding Supportive Office Practices

We wonder if they have procedures in place to decrease the distribution of free formula and formula samples overtime? Perhaps a ten year plan? Perhaps a goal of decreasing distribution by 10% per year?

Notes from the meeting.

It was lovely to see so many of your faces yesterday and meet many of you for the first time. Here is a brief re-cap of the things we discussed. Please feel free to comment, clarify, or take issue with Breastfeed Durham's take-aways!

Attendees: Love Anderson, Bernadette Greene, Gina Rose (Breastfeed Durham team); Kathleen Anderson (BFFC); Sophie Shaikh, Gaby Maradiaga Panayotti, Mara Early, and Lindsay Self (Duke Peds team).

The discussion focus was on clarifying the WHO Code and how it connects to formula distribution in Duke clinics, Duke Peds formula use, structural barriers for Duke families in meeting breastfeeding goals and obtaining pumps and support for feeding, and possibilities for change.

Currently, Duke clinics provide formula samples to families that need to begin supplementation and/or have barriers to obtaining formula. The current practices are not Code compliant; however, as Duke Health is in process of obtaining the Baby Friendly Hospital designation, folks agreed there *might* be a possibility to begin paying for formula in the near future.

The biggest barriers to providing breastfeeding parents support when needing to supplement in low income family's abilities to obtain double electric pumps. Currently, only certain Medicaid plans offer pumps and as the plans are new, the procedures for acquiring a pump are not well understood. WIC often does not provide pumps so families are left to supplement with formula. This inequity is particularly stark at Duke Rox where there are a greater number of families that use Medicaid insurance.

Breastfeed Durham request Duke to create a three-year plan to reduce formula or so that Duke can afford to pay for the formula out of pocket. It's possible that the process maybe quicker than this depending on the current cost of duke paying for formula rather promoting a specific formula company by connecting families to free formula samples.

As of this morning, I've been informed that Holly Branch is no longer Durham's WIC Director. Breastfeed Durham will investigate who may be an appropriate WIC representative to invite to a meeting in a month to discuss increasing communication and collaboration with WIC and the Duke clinics.

Duke requested a PDF copy of the Breastfeeding friendly healthcare award. See above attachment. We would love your feedback. Particularly, any feedback on a good award name and any parts of the application that feel unclear or could be a sticking point for your clinics.

Our goal will be to focus our efforts to support the Duke Rox location as this location has the most supplementation d/t inequities with pump distribution r/t lack of coverage by Medicaid.

Action items:

- Breastfeed Durham to set-up meeting with Holly Branch's successor at WIC for mid-November.
- Duke team to begin to determine current formula use and costs of providing generic formula at market rate as well as investigate feasibility of acquiring different flange sizes for hand pumps.
